

FOR TURKISH CITIZENS IN AUSTIN

Turkish Consulate General in Houston: 2026 Services Guide

Passports, ID cards, birth and marriage registration, military service, powers of attorney and apostilles in Austin. Booking steps and 2026 fees.

SHORT ANSWER

Turkish citizens in Austin are served by the Turkish Consulate General in Houston: 5333 Westheimer Road, Suite 1050, Houston, TX 77056, +1-346-439-6560. There is no consulate in Austin, and no mobile consulate has been announced for Austin so far. Appointments are booked on konsolosluk.gov.tr. Passports, ID cards and powers of attorney require an in-person visit; birth and marriage registration can also be done by mail.

Passports

In person and by appointment only; no mail applications. Bring your Turkish ID card, your old passport and one biometric photo (51x51 mm / 2x2 in). Pay by cash or credit card; no checks or money orders.

Applicants under 18 receive passports valid up to 5 years. Pick up without appointment between 2 and 4 p.m., or send a prepaid tracked envelope for mail return, which saves a second trip from Austin.

Turkish ID card

In person, by appointment. Fee: \$10.20 (birth or renewal) or \$15.30 (lost card). If you married in the U.S., the marriage must be registered before a new ID card application.

Registering a U.S.-born child (birth registration)

DOCUMENT	NOTES
☐ Application form	From the consulate information note
☐ Original birth certificate and a copy	Parents' names must match Turkish records. Long form recommended. For births in Austin: City of Austin Vital Records, \$23, usually within 30 minutes
☐ Parents' IDs	Turkish ID card or passport
☐ Marriage certificate	If applicable
☐ Multiple citizenship form	Because the child is a U.S. citizen
☐ Translation	Translation of the birth certificate if one parent is not Turkish

For a child born within marriage, you can apply by mail: send notarized copies instead of originals, a prepaid tracked return envelope and a money order payable to "Turkish Consulate General." Fees: postage \$31, multiple-citizenship translation \$11.46, birth certificate certification \$8.62.

Marriage registration

A marriage performed in the U.S. can be registered by mail. Ask the consulate for the current document list and fees before you apply. If you married in Travis County, get a certified copy from the Travis County Clerk (\$6) and an apostille if needed.

Apostilles in Austin

The Texas Secretary of State's apostille unit is in Austin: 400 W 15th St, Austin 78701, (512) 463-5705. Same-day service, up to 10 documents per person, \$15 per document (exact cash, card, check or money order).

- **Monday and Friday:** walk-in; waits may exceed an hour.
 - **Tuesday to Thursday:** appointment only.
 - **Which documents:** issued in Texas or notarized by a Texas notary. Certified birth and marriage records must have been issued within the last 5 years.
 - **Notaries:** Texas notaries generally do not accept a foreign passport as ID. A green card or EAD is accepted.
 - **By mail:** Form 2102, about 2 weeks.
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Military service

- **Registration (yoklama):** men born in 2007 and others without a deferral must register by December 31, 2026, through the consulate or e-Devlet.
 - **Paid military service (dövizle askerlik), July 1 to December 31, 2026:** the foreign-currency equivalent of 472,653.60 TL, collected in Houston in U.S. dollars at the Central Bank rate of the payment day, plus a \$45 transfer fee.
 - **Requirements:** working in the U.S. with residence or work authorization, at least 3 years (1,095 days) of work abroad excluding time in Türkiye, and completing the online training at dovizle.msb.gov.tr. In person, by appointment.
 - **Dual citizens:** those born in the U.S. or who came before 18 can defer until the end of age 35, after registering their U.S. citizenship with Turkish civil registry.
 - **F-1 students:** deferral through the Houston Education Attaché.
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Powers of attorney

In person, by appointment, and only at the consulate building (not at mobile consulates). Bring the application form, your Turkish ID card, and the agent's name, Turkish ID number and date of birth. Property, divorce and vehicle matters need 2 passport photos. Emailing a ready text in Word format to consulate.houston@mfa.gov.tr speeds things up. Fees vary by subject and length.

MOBILE CONSULATE

No mobile consular service has been announced for Austin so far. The last ones in Texas were in Dallas (Richardson) in December 2024 and San Antonio in April 2015. New dates are announced on houston-bk.mfa.gov.tr.

FLYING TO TÜRKİYE

There is no nonstop flight from Austin to Istanbul. Turkish Airlines flies nonstop from Houston (IAH) and Dallas (DFW), and both have nonstop flights from Austin. Türkiye is 8 hours ahead of Austin until November 1, 2026, and 9 hours ahead from November 1, 2026 to March 14, 2027.

NOT THE SAME AS U.S. IMMIGRATION

The consulate handles Turkish matters. U.S. visas, green cards and naturalization are handled by USCIS and the U.S. Department of State. If a green card application is pending, check your advance parole status before traveling to Türkiye.
